1600 years ago, St. Leo (400-461AD) wrote the central truth of Christmas: God so united Himself to us and us to Him, that the descent of God to the human level was at the same time the ascent of man to the divine level (The Eternal Vision, p. 198). A Sacred Trust

Here at St. Hubert's we take our outreach programs as a core of our Christian witness of servanthood and charity to those who need it most for they live on the margins of society. I need to relate to you that for our Harvest Home Ingathering for Thanksgiving 60 bags were taken to be filled with food yet only 50 were returned. Fortunately, the numbers worked out at The Marion Sterling School so that food was not in short supply. In the future, if you make such a commitment yet cannot fulfill it, let others know so that we can help pick up the slack. We are all in these projects together and there will be someone to help!

Almighty and most merciful God, we remember before you all poor and neglected persons whom it would be easy for us to forget: the homeless and the destitute, the old and the sick, and all who have none to care for them. Help us to heal those who are broken in body or spirit, and to turn their sorrow into joy. Grant this Father, for the love of your Son, who for our sake became poor, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (Book of Common Prayer, p. 826).

St. Augustus of Hippo (354-430 a.d.) wrote this poem which sought to capture the mystery of the Incarnation.

Maker of the sun,
He is made under the sun.
In the Father he remains,
From his mother he goes forth.
Creator of heaven and earth,
He was born on earth under heaven.
Unspeakably wise,
He is wisely speechless.
Filling the world,
He lies in a manger.
Ruler of the stars,
He nurses at his mother's bosom.
He is both great in the nature of God,
and small in the form of a servant
